<u>Common Name</u> (Botanical)	Habitat Light tolerance Moisture tolerance	Mature Height in feet	Bloom color season	Descriptions	<u>Quantity</u>
Lead Plant (Amorpha canescens)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2-3	purple June – July	This plant has spikes of purple flowers above delicate gray-green leaves. Very drought resistant.	
Wild Columbine (Aquilegia canadensis)	Tolerates all mesic to dry	2 - 4	red/yellow April-June	Lovely flower with red spurs in spring. Re-seeds easily and attracts hummingbirds.	
Jack-in-the-Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum)	Savanna/woodland wet mesic-dry mesic	1-3	green April-July	Unique pitcher shaped flower that is common in woodlands. Produces bright red fruit.	
Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosa)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2-3	orange June - Aug	Brilliant orange flowers attract legions of Monarch butterflies. Does not like fertilizer or "wet feet".	
Sky Blue Aster (Aster azureus)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2 - 31/2	bright blue Aug - Oct	Showy, spreading clusters of 1-inch blue flowers with yellow centers at the top of stems.	
White Wild Indigo (Baptisia leucantha)	Prairie/savanna wet mesic to dry	2-4	white June - July	Striking white spikes of flowers bloom in June with interesting large black seed pods that are held through fall.	
Cream Wild Indigo (Baptisia leucophaea)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	11/2	cream May – June	A beautiful, sprawling, bush-like plant with one foot long drooping flower spikes with large creamy yellow flowers	
Harebell (Campanula rotundifolia)	Prairie/savanna dry mesic to dry	³ ⁄ ₄ - 1	violet June-Sept	Blue bell-shaped flower atop delicate stem. Should be planted away from more aggressive plants.	
New Jersey Tea (Ceanothus americanus)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2	white June-July	A woody stemmed plant of the prairie. Spectacular flowers attract butterflies. (Bunnies love NJ Tea – may need fencing)	
White Prairie Clover (Dalea candida)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	1 – 3	white July - Aug	1 to 3 inch long cylindrical flower spikes rest atop arching stems. White flowers contrast with fine leaves	
Purple Prairie Clover (<i>Dalea purpurea</i>))	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	1 – 3	purple July - Aug	Flowers are dense, cylindrical spikes atop arching stems. This plant is drought resistant.	
Shooting Star (Dodecatheon meadia)	Prairie/savanna wet mesic to dry mesic	¹⁄₂ - 2	white to pink May-June	Lovely, early prairie flower that goes dormant when summer heat arrives.	
Pale Purple Coneflower (Echinacea pallida)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2-4	lavender June - July	Flowers are cones surrounded by thin, pale lavender, long, drooping rays. Seeds loved by wildlife in winter.	
Rattlesnake Master (Eryngium yuccifolium)	Prairie mesic to dry	3-4	white July-Aug	Very unique silvery thistle-type flower heads atop yucca-like foliage.	
Wild Geranium (Geranium maculatum)	Tolerates all mesic to wet mesic	1-2	lavender Apr-June	Attractive woodland wildflower that produces showy lavender flowers clusters. Freely re-seeds	
Prairie Smoke (Geum triflorum)	Prairie/savanna dry mesic to dry	1	pink April – May	Plant has hairy stems with numerous basil leaves. Flowers appear in the spring as feathery plumes.	
Downy Sunflower (Helianthus mollis)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry mesic	2 - 6	yellow August- September	Daisy-like flowers. Stems and leaves are covered by small, soft hairs which give the plant a blue-grey color.	
Rough Blazing Star (Liatris aspera)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2 - 3	violet-purple Jun-Oct	Purple flower heads are loosely and alternately spaced along a wand-like spike up to 1 ½ feet long. Attracts pollinators.	
Prairie Blazing Star (Liatris pycnostachya)	Prairie/savanna wet to mesic	2 - 4	rosy lilac July - Sept	Spectacular spikes of bunched flowers that attract butterflies & hummingbirds.

Virginia Bluebells (Mertensia virginica)	Savanna/woodland wet mesic to mesic	1-3	blue April-May	Pink buds change to blue flowers. Blooms early and goes dormant when summer heat arrives. Nice woodland plant.	
Wild Bergamot (Monarda fistulosa)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2 - 4	lavender July-Sept	Member of the mint family with abundant round heads of tubular flowers. Attracts pollinators.	
Wild Quinine (Parthenium integrifolium)	Prairie wet mesic to dry mesic	3 - 5	white June-Sept	Small white flowers in large flat clusters on stalks that sit above short foliage.	
Woodland Phlox (Phlox divaricata)	Savanna/woodland mesic to dry	1-2	blue July - Aug	Great light-shade, woodland plant. Clusters of showy blue flowers.	
Jacob's Ladder (Polemonium reptans)	Savanna/woodland wet mesic to dry mesic	1 - 2	blue April-June	Blue, bell-shaped flower clusters and attractive foliage.	
Showy Black-eyed Susan (Rudbeckia fulgida)	Prairie wet mesic to dry mesic	2 - 4	yellow June-Sept	Daisy-like flowers with yellowish-orange rays surrounding a brown center. Attracts butterflies.	
Wild Petunia (Ruellia humilus)	Prairie dry mesic to dry	0.5 – 2	violet June - Aug	Classic petunia flower in a lovely lavender color. Well suited for rock gardens and drier areas.	
Royal Catchfly (Silene regia)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2 - 31/2	red July - Aug	Striking bright-red flowers attract hummingbirds. Likes well drained but rich soil.	
Rosin Weed (Silphium integrifolium)	Prairie wet mesic to dry mesic	2 - 6	yellow July - Sept	Yellow, daisy-like flowers atop 3-5 foot tall plants.	
Compass plant (Silphium laciniatum)	Prairie/savanna wet mesic to dry	6 - 9	Yellow June-Sept	Daisy-like flowers atop 6-9 foot stalks. Leaves are large, deeply divided, and often align in a north-south direction	
Showy Goldenrod (Solidago speciosa)	Prairie/savanna dry to mesic	2 - 5	yellow Aug - Oct	Has very showy golden yellow flower plumes and is easy to grow. May be somewhat aggressive.	
Spiderwort (Tradescantia ohiensis)	sun to ½ sun dry to wet mesic	2 - 4	blue May-July	Plants with smooth bluish green stems and leaves. Flowers are in tight clusters atop stems.	
Common Ironweed (Vernonia fasciculata)	Prairie/savanna wet mesic to mesic	4 - 6	violet June-Sept	Brilliant purple flower clusters atop tall stems. Prefers moist soils.	
Culver's Root (Veronicastrum virginicum)	sun to ½ sun dry mesic to wet mesic	3 – 5	white June - Aug	Graceful, branching flower spikes that resemble candelabra.	

NATIVE GRASSES

<u>Common Name</u> (Botanical)	Habitat Light tolerance Moisture tolerance	Mature Height in feet	<u>Bloom</u> season	Descriptions	<u>Quantity</u>
Big Bluestem (Andropogon gerardii)	Prairie/savanna wet mesic to dry	3 - 7	Aug - Sept	Once the dominant grass species of the tallgrass prairie. May become aggressive once established.	
Side-oats Grama (Bouteloua curtipendula)	Prairie mesic to dry	2-3	July - Oct	This grass has tiny purple/orange flowers and delicate seeds that dangle from one side of the stalk.	
Junegrass (Koeleria macrantha)	Prairie dry mesic to dry	1 - 2	May-June	Small sized, cool season, clump-forming grass with erect seed heads.	
Little Bluestem (Schizachyrium scoparium)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	2-3	Aug - Sept	A medium-height grass that prefers slightly drier areas. Stems turn a lovely orange-pink in the fall.	
Indian Grass (Sorghastrum nutans)	Prairie/savanna mesic to dry	3 - 7	Aug - Sept	Tall, clump forming grass with distinct, golden seed head.	
Prairie Dropseed (Sporobolis heterolepis)	Prairie mesic to dry	2-3	Aug Sept	Mounds of soft leaves with gossamer-like seed-heads. This classic prairie grass likes well-drained soil.
